AFRAS Vice Admiral Thomas R. Sargent III ——Gold Medal Award

Chief Warrant Officer Randall J. Rice of US Coast

Guard Air Station Cape Cod was presented the prestigious AFRAS Vice Admiral Thomas R. Sargent III Gold Medal for his heroic life-saving actions on 10 May 2011 while serving as rescue swimmer aboard Coast Guard Helicopter CG6004.

At approximately noon on said date, Rice and his crew launched from Air Station Cape Cod in response to a distress call received from the 45-foot sailing vessel EVA, located 150 nautical miles southeast of Cape Cod. Pounding seas and gale force winds had ripped the mast off the vessel and shattered the windows endangering the lives of the crew. The surrounding waters and deck were littered with sails, lines and debris.

Arriving at an updated position relayed from a concurrently launched HU-25 Aircraft, and unable to establish communications with the vessel, Rice and his crew conducted a search to locate S/V EVA in the tossing 20-30 foot waves. Rice eventually spotted the vessel and vectored the pilot into position.

The aircraft commander initially made the decision not to deploy the rescue swimmer due to numerous hazards in the water, but after further assessment it was determined that deployment was required in order to save the two crewmen – one having sustained a back injury. Chief Warrant Officer Rice entered the water, maneuvered through the 30-foot swells and debris to the vessel and climbed aboard. He quickly cleared the deck of rubble and prepared for two basket hoists of the crew. He meticulously executed each hoist from the deck of EVA as the thrashing waves and raging winds battered the vessel. His swift actions were instrumental in the saving of two lives.

Chief Warrant Officer Rice's courage, judgment, and devotion to duty are most heartily commended and are in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Coast Guard.

AFRAS Silver Medal Award

An AFRAS Silver Medal was awarded to US Coast Guard Auxiliarists Ronald Johnson, Dennis Szeba, Jim Mauk, Bill Gerdsen, and Fred Jelinek for their outstanding operational skill while serving aboard Auxiliary Facility VALROSE II on 30 June, 2011.

While underway conducting man overboard training, the Auxiliary crew noticed a woman frantically waiving her hands while her small boat was circling. The operator of the boat was slumped over the helm in obvious medical distress. Auxiliarist Johnson, serving as coxswain, sprang into action and skillfully maneuvered the Auxiliary vessel alongside the out of control boat to get it under control and further assess the situation.

Once alongside, Auxiliarists Jelinek and Gerdsen boarded the boat and immediately determined the operator was in cardiac arrest. They quickly started CPR while Auxiliarists Johnson, Mauk and Szeba rigged the small boat for alongside tow and coordinated additional assistance with Coast Guard Station Emerald Isle and local EMS.

The Auxiliary team continued CPR as they towed the boat toward shore while the station dispatched one of its rescue boats to assist. Upon rendezvousing, the station and auxiliary teams continued all attempts to revive the boater until they reached the pier and the rescue team successfully employed an Automatic Emergency Defibrillator restarting the boater's heart. The boater was stabilized and transferred to local EMS.

The fast action, perseverance, and devotion to duty displayed by Auxiliarists Ronald Johnson, Dennis Szeba, Jim Mauk, Bill Gerdsen, and Fred Jelinek proved critical to saving the boater's life and resulted in his full recovery from the events of that June afternoon.

AFRAS Amver Award

AFRAS presented its Amver Plaque to the captain and crew of M/V OLEANDER, a Marshall Islands flagged container ship managed by Container Ship Management Ltd out of Bermuda for the rescue of four sailors on November 6, 2011.


orth American Rally to the Caribbean, from Newport to

The Elle, a 46-foot sailing yacht, was participating in the North American Rally to the Caribbean, from Newport to Bermuda, when they encountered gale force winds greater than 40 knots and 30 foot seas. Their sailboat lost all steering and was helplessly adrift in the gale.

Rescue authorities in Bermuda received the initial distress call and US Coast Guard rescue personnel agreed to assist in the search and rescue case. The Marshall Island flagged ship, on a voyage to Bermuda, was near the Elle and Captain Jurszo agreed to divert to assist the sailboat. Captain Jurszo expertly maneuvered the Oleander next to the sailing vessel avoiding the mast that was wildly swinging near his outside steering station.

When one of the sailors lost balance and plunged into the ocean, the crew of Oleander reacted quickly, threw him a line which he tied to his safety harness, and hauled him back over the side. All four sailors were successfully transferred from Elle to the container ship in the difficult conditions and then cared for by the crew.

The Automated Mutual Assistance Vessel Rescue System (Amver), sponsored by the United States Coast Guard, is a unique, computer-based, and voluntary global ship reporting system used worldwide by search and rescue authorities to arrange for assistance to persons in distress at sea. AFRAS commends the expert actions of the captain and crew of OLEANDER for their role in this dramatic rescue.

Sea Tow Clarks Hill Lake Captain Jon G. Gridley

is cited "for life saving efforts" for his performance of duty on the afternoon of the 4th of July, 2011. While seeking safe harbor from an intense thunderstorm which produced winds in excess of 50 knots and a three to four foot choppy sea state, Captain Gridley responded to a distress call from a houseboat caught in the storm out on the lake.

Captain Gridley was alerted that there were people in the water and in distress. Not concerned for their own safety, Captain Gridley and a friend immediately got underway in the howling wind and tough sea conditions to render assistance.

Once on scene with the houseboat, Captain Gridley learned that after a 12 year old boy (wearing a life jacket) was blown overboard by the wind, an adult male jumped off the houseboat into the water without a life jacket in an effort to save the boy, who subsequently was recovered in good health. When Gridley quickly located the missing adult male, he was found unconscious and about to submerge below the surface of the water.

After pulling the man aboard his vessel, Captain Gridley quickly headed back to the marina while his friend performed CPR. The victim was delivered to the dock, where he was revived and transferred to awaiting Emergency Medical Services.

2012 AFRAS CAR-SAR Award

(Caribbean Search and Rescue)

The AFRAS Car-Sar Award was presented to Bahamas Air-Sea and Rescue (BASRA) Abaco for their heroic efforts on November 7th, 2011 in the rescue attempt of six crewmembers aboard the Fishing Vessel HIDE OUT.

n the early morning hours of that fateful day, the F/V HIDE OUT attempted to negotiate the Man-O-War passage despite the torrential seas hammering the Abaco coastline. Immediately upon approaching the channel, HIDE OUT encountered breaking surf conditions with 12-15 foot waves toppling over the undersized 42 foot boat. Before the crew could issue a distress call, all six persons were thrown into the water as the fishing vessel quickly sank. Miraculously, a crewmember was able to make a mobile phone call while clinging to a raft.

Within minutes of the BASRA operations center receiving the distress alert, Clay Wilhoyte and his oldest son, Andrew, were dispatched from nearby Hope Town in BASRA's 26 foot rigid hull inflatable boat (RHIB). On scene, the BASRA team maneuvered among dangerous coral heads and breaking seas to rescue four of HIDE OUT's six crewmembers.

A U.S. Coast Guard helicopter was launched to help with the rescue efforts and arrived just as BASRA recovered the fifth fisherman, now deceased. The MH-60 pilot, Lt Commander Bill Friday remarked: "With the Coast Guard helicopter located over 45 minutes away, BASRA's Rescue Boat Captain Clay Wilhoyte's selfless actions are the reason four people are alive today. By the time the USCG helicopter arrived, BASRA had already saturated the immediate scene of the capsized sport fishing vessel, and provided recommendations to us to expand the search area based on local knowledge and weather conditions. The rescue efforts were compounded by dangerous seas breaking over the reef, threatening the BA<mark>SRA</mark> vessel with its own peril as it continued the unsuccessful search of the final crewmember."

The BASRA RHIB continued searching for the sixth missing crewmember despite suffering extensive damage in the initial rescue of the four survivors; sustaining repeated impact from breaking waves that caused the center console to partially separate from the deck and the transom's hydraulic engine lift to malfunction. The sixth

crewmember was never located during the exhaustive search efforts that followed.

A volunteer SAR organization formed in 1960, BASRA has responded to thousands of maritime distress calls since inception. Through rescue cases similar to the ones highlighted here, BASRA Abaco and its dedicated team

of volunteers continue to selflessly serve the public, saving countless lives of residents and visitors to the northern Bahamas. The lifesaving actions of BASRA's Captain and crew and the coordination of their operations center are to be commended and are in keeping with the highest traditions of the maritime community to aid others in distress.
